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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Focusing on the need for inclusive higher education in and around the geographical region of Thoubal District, three young visionaries during the 1960's, namely Shri AK Birendra Singh, Shri Jatishwor Luwang and Shri. I.S Akoijam discussed and conceptualized the idea of establishing a college which would maximize the accessibility of higher education and ease the hardship of pursuing higher education which was till then available only at the State Capital, Imphal. The idea blossomed fruitful on 8th August 1963 with the first Night Shift session being started at the then Chaoyaima High School. The once voluntarily run institution is now a full-fledged Degree College affiliated to Manipur University and approved by UGC under Section 2(f) and 12(b) of UGC Act and apt to receive grant for research and development scheme from various funding agencies. The college was accredited with grade "B" in 2015 during the first cycle by NAAC Accreditation. Further the IQAC of Thoubal College is striving hard for 2nd cycle of NAAC Accreditation.

From a purely Arts College with ten (10) subjects in 1963, the college has grown into a multi-discipline college offering graduate courses in Science and Arts. During the last five years, the college produced toppers and rank holders in the BA/BSc Examination of Manipur University. It runs B.Voc Course under the sponsorship of UGC in 3(Three) trades: (i) Food Processing and Engineering (ii) Tourism and Hospitality Management (iii) Yoga and Nature Cure functioning. It also has one study Centre for IGNOU offering Bachelor Degree Programmes, Bachelor Preparation Programme and Master Degree Programmes in Political Science, Education, History and English.

Thoubal College has also been awarded "Best College" in North East Graduate Congress-2019 held at University of Science and Technology, Meghalaya. Under UGC-NERO, Guwahati, One Indoor Sports Training Centre, One swimming Pool and One Fitness Centre have been constructed in the college. The college is also approved by RUSA for up-gradation to Model College of the district.

Vision

Recognizing the dynamic pattern in contemporary education arena at national and global level, Thoubal College strives to adapt, reaffirm and review its vision to contain demand for such changes. Target and Goals are highlighted for the realization of principle enshrined in the national policy for higher education. The vision of the college, in the broader spectrum, is to be a global leader in Education by establishing global standard education system. Since its inception, Thoubal College seeks to provide utility-based, skill integrated, cost-efficient and top notch quality education thereby empowering the students to cope with and excel in the midst of possible intellectual and psychological challenges.

The college also works with a vision to provide holistic education by combining equal mix of technical excellence, human values and life skills to young minds; to broaden the range of disciplines offered to undergraduate students; to gradually established post-graduate programmes; to motivate research initiatives with practical and social relevance and to impart knowledge for overall development of human personality and promote communal harmony.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- Thoubal College has a big campus of about 13 acres of land, picturesque with beautiful slope of nearby hills supporting a refreshing and conducive environment for learning.
- Thoubal College strongly adhere to the principle of holistic, inclusive and futuristic education integrated with unique social and cultural values.
- The college Promotes inclusive and value-based education by encouraging initiatives towards gender sensitization, equity and justice, environmental consciousness as well as health and hygiene.
- Thoubal College campaigns and supports for a culture of eco-friendly practices targeting an environmentally sustainable campus. The College campus is almost plastic free and follows a minimal waste, conservation of energy and protection of biodiversity system.
- The College is well known for its academic, co-curricular and extracurricular achievements. The College was awarded the 'Best College' in North East Graduate Congress-2019 held at University of Science and Technology, Meghalaya.
- It has state- of -the -art Fitness Centre (gym), Sports Complex and Swimming Pool. The college has produced several sports personalities at the inter-university and national level apart from many rank holders at B.A /B.Sc. examinations conducted by Manipur University.
- The College has well qualified faculty members including Ph.D. and M.Phil. Degree holders which help enhance the outcome of teaching-learning process by incorporating new ideas and concepts gained from their research.
- Large number of students are enrolled every year in both Science and Arts subjects.
- The college also has vocational courses i.e., Food Processing, Tourism and

Hospitality Management, Yoga and Nature Cure.

- Oriented for overall wellbeing of the students with effective Student Support Service System and mentoring process.
- The IGNOU Study Centre at Thoubal College runs many correspondent programmes including one on Korean Language.
- An active Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a central role in the monitoring and maintaining the overall quality of the institution.

Institutional Weakness

- Being a Govt. College, any vacant post of the faculty staff cannot be filled up by the College as and when required.
- The College has no Career Counselling and Placement Cells.
- Being an undergraduate college that focuses on teaching and learning activities, there is limited scope in intensifying the research rigor in the campus.
- Being an affiliated College, it is bound to follow the curriculum designed by the University and hence there is less scope for flexibility in curriculum design and delivery.
- Limited financial and human resources in the use of digital technology to enhance teaching- learning in campus.
- Lack of residential quarters of staffs.
- Some of the students are found to be belonging to the economically disadvantaged group thereby they take up part-time jobs and works as manual labourers in construction and agricultural sectors, hampers the attendance of the students.
- The college has little facilities for the differently abled students.
- Inadequate space and number of books and journals related to the subjects in the Library of the College due to financial constraints.

Institutional Opportunity

- Strengthening alumni interactions to provide mentorship, internships and career guidance to our students to help both financial and social support.
- After the successful upgradation to " Model Degree College " by RUSA, the College has the opportunity to become an Autonomous College of Multi-Disciplinary one in NEP-2020 having Arts, Science, Vocational and ITEP - courses.
- Presence of many well qualified teachers having Ph.D. and M.Phil., there is opportunity of opening Post Graduate courses both in arts and science subjects.
- Enhancing and promoting Research facilities.
- Setting up of Career Counselling and Placement Cell.
- Improving ICT lab facilities to improve pedagogic techniques.
- Initiating IT based short term courses which will help enhance employability of students in all fields.

Institutional Challenge

- Non-functioning of the existing Hostels due to the lack of infrastructures and man power.
- Lack of teaching staff as per University rules and lack of non-teaching staff
- Initiation of any new academic programme requires a long and complicated procedure for getting permissions from multiple authorities which often delays the process.
- Limited number of companies and industries in the state, limits Students' placement/internship for vocational students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Thoubal college, Thoubal affiliated to Manipur University, ensures effective curricular is delivered through a well-planned and documented process. Every year, in the new academic session, the academic committee meets to deliberate and draw up the academic calendar and time-table to be followed to cover the syllabus in adequate time. Every department in the college is directed to discuss its departmental meeting to discuss and distribute the work load amongst the faculty members. The academic calendar contains all the important information for the commencement of classes, holidays, internal test and other important occasions in the college.

At the end of every calendar year, institution is committed to integrate issues such as gender, environmental and sustainability, human values and professional ethics into the curriculum through various seminars, workshops and lectures programmed by inviting eminent scholars and experts. In the last five years teachers of the institution has participated in academe council/BOS of affiliating University, Setting of Question paper for UG/P.G Programme, Assessment/Evaluation process of the affiliating University.

Academic Flexibility

- Elective courses are offered in 22 Departments.

- 2 certificate programmes are offered and 58 students were enrolled in the last 5 years in two batches.

-Experiential learning through field work were carried out by 5 (five) departments (Botany, Geography, Zoology, Geology and Statistics) in the last 5 years.

-106 students undertook fieldwork for the last academic year.

-College obtained feedbacks from stakeholders (Students, Teachers, Alumni and parents) to assist in reviewing the curricular aspects and learning in the college.

The IQAC monitors the overall teaching, learning and outcomes conducting meetings with stakeholders to achieve all the curricular aspect of the college.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Thoubal College has 69 regular teaching faculty out of 75 sanction post and 1386 student in the latest completed year in the ratio of 20 : 1. Out of 69 regular teachers, we have 26 Ph.D. holders and average teaching experience of full time teachers is 17.46. Also, average enrollment percentage of students for the last 5 years is

53.52. Our college strictly implements the state reservation norm in the admission process and has filled up 71.4 average percentage from the reserved categories.

To improve learning experience in the college, a student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodological are used for enhancing learning experiences.

Experiential learning includes

1. Practical laboratory
2. Field Visits and Survey

Participative learning involves

1. Events organizing
2. Workshops
3. Social services
4. Cultural activities
5. Sports
6. Debate/Essay Competition etc.

For enhancing solving skills students involved/engaged in student's welfare union. Teacher use ICT tools effectively in times of pandemic to conduct online class, online examination etc. 66 teachers act as a mentor to students in the ratio of 21:1. Students learning outcome is evaluated frequently in the form of mid-term Examination, class test, practical test, and assignment etc. to assess the subject knowledge and to see if course objective are met. The college also conducts remedial coaching classes for slow learners. All the stakeholders like students, teachers, parents and alumni actively involved to achieve all the above goals for the students centric learning and evaluation.

The college imparts several add-on/certificates courses to enable students to acquire employability skills after completion of the course. Students are encouraged to participate in various activities like sports and cultural events in state, national and even international platform which have brought many achievements to the college. Lastly, under this criteria students satisfactory survey regarding teaching learning process was conducted from 1122 students and collected data were analyzed for 907 students.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Thoubal College encourages teachers to engage in research, innovation and extension activities. In the last five (5) years (2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2020-21), eight (8) department in the college were awarded 23 Lakh research projects grants by the Government.

- Twenty one (21) seminars/conferences/workshops were conducted by the college.
- One hundred and seven (107) research papers were published in the journals notified on UGC website.
- Forty four (44) books and chapters in edited volumes/books and papers in national/international conference proceedings were published.
- In the last five (5) years (2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2020-21), twenty eight (28) extension and outreach programs were conducted by college:

1. 2151 students participated in extension activities
 2. Received three Awards/recognition and one Best College Award.
 3. Involved in flood relief Camp in 2017
 4. Involved in Food Mela in 2017 and 2018 at State Level Food Mela and International Sangai Festival.
 5. Cleanliness competition was conducted amongst the college departments (Swachata Hi Sewa, Swachch Bharat) from 15th Sept, 2018 to 2nd Oct, 2018.
 6. Donated and distributed college made sanitizer and mask on 2021.
 7. Blood donation camp was conducted by NSS and NCC of Thoubal College on 23rd April 2017.
 8. Foods donated to Destitute Home of Women on 7th Dec, 2020.
- College has two (2) MoUs with Thangjam Agro based Industry Pvt. Ltd. and Kangla Food Pvt. Ltd., Imphal.
 - College has two (2) collaborations for internship in 2019-20 and 2020-21 with Raj Medicity and Vishal Mart, Imphal.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Thoubal College, under the collective coordination of Construction Committee and Planning Committee, strive to maintain and upgrade its infrastructure and learning resource that are crucial for exerting maximum teaching-learning output. Summarizations of such facilities are:

1. It has 34 Classroom and 3 Seminar Hall each capable of hosting 150 seats. Out of these three Seminar Hall, one (1) Hall is equipped or enable with ITC facilities.
2. It has 11 ICT enabled classroom.
3. It has a Multi-Purpose Hall with 1500 seating capacities.
4. All the Science department of the college has the latest laboratory infrastructure.
5. The college has 93 Computers including 22 Computer attached to Computer Science Department, that has solar power backup facilities.
6. The Campus is enable with Wifi bandwidth 10Mbps.
7. The College has Biotech Hub that provides basic Biotechnology Infrastructure and research facilities.
8. Thoubal College Library sufficiently house books, journal, newspaper etc that satisfy the need of both students and teachers. The Library is partially automated with Library Management system Version 1.0.
9. The College subscribed to N-List both for its teachers and students. It also subscribed to some relevance e-resource.
10. Apart from the regular 200Kv Transformer, the institution have two Power Generators each with capacity of 10Kv back-up Administrative Block and Bio Technology Hub.
11. Sports and Cultural Infrastructure of the Institution includes:
 1. Open Playground for Football, Javelin throw, High jump, Long jump, tug-of-war, Handball and Archery Practices.
 2. Fitness Centre that houses gym facilities and Hall for Yoga Centre
 3. Indoor Stadium attached with 2 Badminton Court and Table Tennis
 4. Multipurpose Hall for Cultural activities.
 5. Swimming Pool
1. The Institution have separate vehicle parking facilities (2-Wheelers and 4-Wheelers) for both students and Teachers.

2. It has Canteen facilities within the Campus.
3. It has separate Hostel facilities for Boys and Girls in the campus.
4. It has sufficient lavatories for students and staff with female-male separation (Disabled friendly).

Student Support and Progression

1. Thoubal College encourages, supports and helps its eligible students to avail scholarship and other financial assistance from different source like government. An average of 27.86 % of the students (Thoubal College) benefited from scholarship provided by government.
2. The Institution promotes development of its students in soft skills, ICT skills and Life skills like Yoga and Physical fitness.
3. Thoubal College through its efficient Cell like Anti-Ragging Cell, Women's Cell, SC/ST Cell, Minority Community Cell etc.. to ensure that the campus is ragging free and free from all form of discriminations.
4. Out of the total students who completed their graduation in the past 5 years, 13.07% of them have enrolled and pursued for higher education.
5. The institution also encourages its students to participate at various sports and cultural activities besides from academic curriculum. Around 6.2 % of the College students participated in sport and cultural activities. During the past five years, 60 awards or medals were accorded to its students. The College was also awarded the "Best College" at University of Science and Technology, Meghalaya.
6. The institution also facilitates student's active participation, engagement and representation in various administrative, curricular and extracurricular activities through its Student Union, NCC and NSS. Not only does it represent the voice and concern of the student communities, the Union also acts as mediator and maintains connections between students and teaching communities at administrative level. It also regularly organized Cultural Events, Sports Events etc annually.
7. Alumni of Thoubal College, under collective name Thoubal College Alumni Association, extend their support and cooperation to the overall progress and development of the college. It also provides financial assistance and other possible support system from time to time for the welfare of the College. The

Governance, Leadership and Management

The Principal looks after the administration of the college under the direct supervision of the Director (University and Higher Education, Govt. of Manipur). The Principal is, in turn, assisted by Heads of departments, various Committees or Cells which are formed by the Principal herself (himself) and many other stakeholders including college students union in formulating and in executing the vision, plan and mission of the college. Each committee chaired by the Principal comprises of one convener and some other members drawn from the teaching and the non-teaching staffs and is assigned with formulating and executing a policy. The College has an active Teachers' Association which comprises of all regular teachers. The Association also helps the Principal in discharging her administrative duties in many ways. The NCC and the NSS units also help the principal in executing many especially co-curricular activities.

The IQAC of the college is perhaps the most important committee or cell through which the principal plays an important role in formulating every perspective plan and policy by taking into consideration of inputs from all stake-holders. It executes and reviews every policy by setting quality benchmarks for maximum output. Indeed, the IQAC discharges the role of custodian of documentary evidences of all the activities whether academic or

non-academic. The college adopts effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff with regard to their personal lives and professional developments.

The Performance Appraisal and Annual Report of the Teaching and Non- Teaching Staffs are submitted regularly to the higher authority i.e. Directorate of University and Higher Education. The College has a policy and strategy for mobilising financial resource from various sources including its alumni. In order maintain accountability and transparency, the annual financial transactions of the college are subjected to internal and external audit.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The Institution seeks to provide equal opportunity for all the students. Through its different Cells, it follows a zero tolerance policy towards any form of gender discrimination. There is a separate Women's Cell that focuses on empowering women and promoting gender equality. The College set up separate Girl's Common room with necessary facilities.

The College is highly conscious and determined in addressing environmental issues and promoting environmental consciousness and sustainability. It has a Green Audit Committee responsible in leading the campus a cleaner, safer and more ecological friendly. Observation of significant days related to environment like Earth Day, Soil Day, Nature Conservation Day, Ozone Protection Day and Pollution Prevention Day and other days of important issues are done regularly in the College.

With the aim of instilling values of responsible citizens, the college organised various activities like cleanliness and tree plantation drive during Gandhi Jayanti and Swachhta Pakhwada Week. Say No to Single use plastic campaign is also held by the volunteers of Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat.

The institution has a prescribed code of conduct for the students, teachers, administrator and other staff which are to be strictly adhered.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

Thoubal College is affiliated to Manipur University and all the subjects follow the syllabus prescribed by Manipur University. At the beginning of every new academic session, the Academic Committee of the college meets to deliberate and draw up the Academic Calendar and the timetable to be followed to cover the syllabus in adequate time. Every department is directed to conduct its departmental meeting to discuss and distribute the work load amongst the faculty members. Regular departmental meetings throughout the academic session takes stock of the progress of each teacher and in the event of any concern for non-completion of the syllabus in the given timeframe due to any unforeseen factors, remedial classes are also initiated. Unit tests, assignments, internal assessments, students' seminars, field project report are the means taking formal evaluations. Students are encouraged to give their feedback as well as to meet the concerned faculty members for any problems or doubts that they face with regards to their subjects. Every department gives importance to provide adequate time for revision and clearing of doubts after completion of the syllabus so that students are well prepared and to boost the confidence of the students to face the University examinations.

Learning outside the four walls of the classroom is promoted through study tours or field trips to places where the students can gain further insights into what they study. There is also provision for field visits, study tours and hands on training and industrial visits in some subjects as a part of experiential learning to make the students understand to certain portions of the curriculum. Group discussions, projects works, class seminars, paper presentations, home assignments and encouraged to make the teaching of the curriculum more effective. Subjects like Geology, Geography, statistics, Botany and Zoology have consistently emphasized on experiential learning by taking their students to sites as field Study Tour related to their syllabus to enhance the practical knowledge and experience of their students. The college is well equipped classrooms, smart rooms and library to cater to the needs of both students and teachers. The use of smart rooms and use of ICT facilities available in the College is also encouraged amongst the teachers to make teaching and curriculum delivery more interesting for students. The college also conducts workshops to train faculty members in the use of technology to assist and improve their teaching and enable them to utilize the smart rooms and technology to enhance their curriculum delivery. Departments conduct various seminars and workshops related to their curriculum. The college also invites scholars and eminent personalities to deliver lectures on topics that are relevant for the students to further their knowledge and learning.

The IQAC monitors the overall teaching and learning process by collecting the students' feedback regularly. Faculty members of the College are constantly encouraged to attend orientation programmes, refresher courses, seminars, conferences, workshops etc to update their knowledge. The institution actively participates in the course design. Not only Students of the College, surrounding youths has acquired the regular facilities of exercise in the fitness centre from this academic year.

1.1.2 The institution adheres to the academic calendar including for the conduct of CIE

Response:

The Academic Calendar of the college is prepared by the Academic Committee in consultation with the IQAC Coordinator before the commencement of every academic year. The academic calendar contains all the important information for the commencement of classes, holidays, internal tests and other important occasions in the college. The academic calendar is circulated to all the HODs to be displayed in every department as well as on the notice boards of the College for the benefit of the students and staff. The Academic Calendar is also uploaded in the college website for information and compliance.

Thoubal College being an affiliated college of Manipur University, has taken steps to follow the directive of conducting Internal Tests of 30 marks. As per the decision taken by the Academic Council, it was agreed that 2 tests would be conducted in every semester and the best marks out of the 2 tests would be chosen, giving every student a chance to improve his score or the option of having another chance in case the student misses a test due to unavoidable circumstances. The first Internal Test is scheduled to take place 2 months after commencement of classes and the second test after a month of the first test. Mid-term examinations are also held for each and every semester. The Examination Section has been entrusted with declaring the dates of the tests and the necessary arrangements for the smooth conduct of the tests. The examination Section also declares the deadline for submission of marks by the teachers so that they can be compiled and sent to the University in time. Continuous Internal Exams (CIE) also includes assignments, presentations, unit tests, projects and seminars.

The Academic Calendar incorporates “Curriculum enrichment programme” in every academic session to broaden the students learning experience beyond their main course of study. Curriculum enrichment activities are generally in the form of seminars, invitation of scholars or eminent personalities to give talks in their given fields of specialization or contemporary issues, workshops.

Cleaning the college campus, planting trees, and caring for the college environment are all examples of social work or community service that take place on a daily basis, especially on days like Gandhi Jayanti on October 2nd and World Environment Day on June 5th. Students, faculty, and staff join forces for a college-wide clean-up effort. The College Week, which is usually held in October-November, reflects the commitment of the College not only for academic excellence but also leisure and recreation. Extracurricular activities such as football, volleyball, basketball, debates, extempore speech, essay writing, skits, musical concerts, fosters sense of identity and belonging among the students. It is a time for the students to relax and enjoy from the stress and pressure of studies and tedious lectures. The College Foundation Day celebrated annually on 8th August also offers an opportunity for curriculum enrichment. Cultural dances, songs and musical performances, distribution of prizes for the various events during College week and felicitation of meritorious students are some of the recurring highlights of the College Foundation Day.

The examination committee of the college displays the time-table for college mid-term and evaluation procedure in the notice board well in advance. The departments prepare their own teaching plans in their

meetings keeping in mind the schedule of college mid-term and evaluation.

Response:

Thoubal College is a premier College in the Thoubal District and as an affiliated College of Manipur University follows the curriculum prescribed by Manipur University. As a result, the General Foundation Course (GFC), Regional Development (RD), and Environmental Science (EVS) are non-credit subjects that every student is required to study during his undergraduate programme, and these courses integrate issues of human values, gender, environment, and sustainability.

Regional Development is a third-semester option that teaches students about Manipur's "society and culture" and investigates the themes of "ethnic fusion and fission." "The Manipur Women and the Changing World" aims to educate students on the gender-culture debate, women's social dynamics, women's economic status, and women's standing.

Environmental Science is a 4th semester obligatory option that incorporates environmental topics into the curriculum. Environmental Science aims to instil a love and concern for the environment in students by teaching them about natural resources, ecosystems, biodiversity, pollution, human population, and social issues relating to the environment.

Through various other methods such as seminars, workshops, lectures by eminent scholars and personalities, and other Programs that are generally organised by the various departments in the beginning and towards the end of every academic year, the institution is committed to integrating issues related to gender, environment and sustainability, human values and professional ethics into the curriculum. A separate Girl's Common Room is available at the college, complete with indoor activities, chairs and tables, and reading materials. A teacher is appointed as Dean of Students' Welfare to take responsibility of the students. Women's safety and security are taken seriously at the college that is why separate washrooms are provided for female students and faculty.

A voluntary blood donation Camp was organized by the NSS on the Patriots Day at Khongjom War Memorial Complex on-23/04/2018. Thoubal College's National Service Scheme (NSS) section has been in the forefront of developing human values **Swachhata Hi Seva** from the 15th September to the 2nd October, 2018. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

Thoubal College begins assessing students' learning levels early in the admission process. Student performance on the previous exam serves as a rough indicator of the student's learning status at the beginning of the semester. In addition, upon admission, students will be advised by the Admissions Board on the program they have chosen. Students' learning levels are assessed through the following programs and activities:

1. Innovative and practical ways of curriculum delivery are used to accommodate students' various learning pace.
2. Unit tests and paper presentations are conducted at the subject teacher's discretion each semester, while internal assessment is done through Assignments or Class Tests.
3. Internal evaluation is used to evaluate students' academic achievement prior to the university's End Semester Examination. This is done to see if the students understand the important topics that are being taught.
4. Under the mentor-mentee scheme, each instructor is assigned a set number of mentees.
5. Students who are more advanced than their peers are encouraged to participate in the subject beyond the scope of the syllabus by providing advanced academic information.
6. Students who are underperforming are allocated remedial classes, and special attention is paid to providing them with the tools they need to improve their grades.
7. For each paper, the lecture period is set at one hour (60 minutes) to allow adequate time for lectures and any questions students may have about the paper.
8. On a case-by-case basis, the teacher can also set up a separate tutorial class. The teacher may provide a unit test after each unit has been completed.
9. In practical subjects, the teacher makes every attempt to conduct as many practical classes feasible.
10. Field trips are also organised for the students' benefit, allowing them to put the concepts and theories gained in the classroom into reality.
11. Students are also encouraged to compete in academic competitions held locally, statewide, and even nationally, as well as to prepare for competitive exams.
12. Teachers provide unrestricted assistance to promising students in their academic pursuits by providing them with supplemental reading lists and access to internet reading materials.
13. Students who appear to be falling behind are given extra attention, and every effort is made to determine the nature of the challenges they are facing, whether they are academic or social.
14. The teacher/mentor assigned to the student has responsibility for the mentee's attendance, test performance, and mental health.
15. Through group discussions, group projects, and other activities that foster friendship, students are also encouraged to assist one another in the learning process.
16. The college conduct Remedial Coaching Classes for slow learners.
17. The college offers an NCC unit and three NSS units, which provide excellent opportunities for students to develop a sense of civic responsibility.

Colleges improve their learning experience by incorporating student-centric methods such as experiential learning, participatory learning, and problem-solving methods. The university-mandated curriculum includes provisions for providing students with an experiential and participatory learning experience in most programs, they are:

Experiential learning in the curriculum:

1. Practical laboratory courses in BSc programs, and in BA Offer from the Department of Education.
2. Field visits and surveys.

Training and social services:

The college imparts several add-on/certificate courses to enable students to acquire additional skills for raising their employability chances after they graduates. Students of B.Voc, Department of Food Processing and Engineering with teachers of the College opened stall in the State Level Food Mela (First kind in Manipur) 17th -18th April, 2017 and participated International Sangai Festival held in Imphal, November, 2018 by opening food stalls prepared by Students of the College. Students of the College with Teaching & Non-Teaching Staff organized **Swachata Hi Sewa** from Sept 15th-2nd Oct 2018 in connection with the 70th years of Indian Independence & 3rd swachch Ta Hi Bharat Mission, Government of India with initiative of the NSS units of the College. Cleanliness Competition conducted amongst the Departments of the College. During which Pledge taking ceremony, Motivational Speech, Cleanliness Drive, the students and faculty members of the college took up Tree Plantation activities in the campus and approach roads of the College. Volunteers from the NCC and NSS units organized International Day of Yoga, Swachhta Hi Seva, Ek Bharat Shresta Bharat, World AIDS Day, Azadi ka Amrut Mahotsav and more.

Participation in functions:

Workshop on Intensive Care Behaviour on Covid-19 was held on November 19, 2020. Student Collaboration at Organizational Events: Students participated in events and festivals such as fresh meetings, farewell parties, cultural programs, and Teachers' Day programs. NCC and NSS collaborated with the Skills India Mission to hold a workshop on "Developing Entrepreneurial Skills". Students are also

Sports and Cultural Programs:

Students are encouraged to participate in various contests on state, national and even international platforms, which have brought many achievements to the College. Many students participated in the game & sports area and received many awards. In 2017, 74 students participated in state / university level sporting events and won 46 medals. In the same year, 12 students participated in a national sporting event, all of which won medals. In the same year, he won a medal at the international level. Th. Heller Singh won a medal at the National Archery (Indian Round) in 2018, Mr. L. Milan Meitei in 2019, and Mr. Manja Meitei in Kabaddi in 2019.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

At Thoubal College, teachers are consciously working to use ICT tools to enhance the teaching and learning process, thereby maximizing the learning outcomes of the curriculum. Most classrooms are equipped with smart boards, LCD projectors and computers to promote effective education. In-house workshops for hands-on training on the use of ICT tools are conducted to train teachers, especially older teachers who are not very technically savvy. Students use these tools to conduct seminars in the classroom. Teachers complement traditional education with PowerPoint and video lectures. Slides etc. WhatsApp groups are formed by class to improve communication and accessibility between teachers and students. During the Covid19 blockade, students are in constant contact with these WhatsApp groups via email. Lecture recordings and soft copies of class notes were distributed through these media. Online courses are offered through online platforms such as Google Meet, Moodle, Zoom and Whatsapp. Lecture records of some teachers are also available on YouTube. The university campus has Wi-Fi and teachers and students have free access to the internet. Universities have access to a wide range of e-learning resources. The college has been on the NLIST since 2011. Teachers and students are registered NLIST users who have access to e-books and e-journals. To further support teachers and students, university librarians have set up another digital library and WhatsApp group.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode****Response:**

The college takes up initiatives to make internal assessments transparent and effective:

1. University norms regarding program / course exam patterns are communicated to students through the university's perspective.
2. A staff meeting are periodically held at the beginning of the academic session to discuss the frequency and timing of internal assessments to be conducted and ensure that provisional dates are reflected in the academic calendar for that semester / session. This is communicated to the Academic Council through the Research Committee.
3. Examination committees are formed annually to coordinate internal and external examination activities and inform students, teachers, and administrative staff about the examination.
4. The schedule for each department's internal assessment dates will be displayed early on the bulletin board to inform students about the assessment process. Minimum of one or two internal assessment tests are held per semester
5. Continuous assessment reports (class tests/seminars/assignments) for all courses are displayed on

the notice board.

6. Staff meetings are held regularly to evaluate and review the evaluation process and discuss audit-related complaints. • Students are free to interact with the teacher to resolve their evaluation complaints.
7. Internal placement test evaluations are conducted by teachers in each department
8. Internal evaluation grades BSc Biotechnology, BSc Food Technology, and BCA are checked by the principal before being sent to college.
9. In the case of a science university practical exam, an external examiner will evaluate the practical exam book and the answer sheet of the practical exam and perform an oral audit.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

Internal exam-related concerns are handled in a transparent, timely, and effective manner at Thoubal College.

- Throughout the semester, there will be several internal exams. Module/class/task/attendance seminar/practical skill evaluation/project work evaluation, and so on.
- Students who perform poorly on internal evaluations receive remedial classes and are permitted to take a re-test; any improvements are officially recorded and acknowledged.
- If a student is dissatisfied with the evaluation procedure or the assessment/test results, he/she may complain to the Head of Department. If the issue with the exam is minor, it may be rectified at the departmental level; otherwise, it should be brought to the attention of the examination committee so that prompt and appropriate action can be taken.
- Students may be denied access to exams if they do not maintain a minimal attendance percentage; a verified and credible justification for the extended absence must be provided.
- If the cause for a student's absence is justified and credible after verification, a re-test may be given.
- With the consent of the examination committee and the Principal, re-examinations may be undertaken under specific circumstances.
- For students who have to participate in the games and sports, cultural and NSS/NCC camping events etc representing College and University at State, National and International levels, special arrangements are made by the Examination Committee.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Teachers and students are aware of the stated Programme and course outcomes of the Programmes offered by the institution.

Response:

Thoubal College teachers and students are aware of the stated programme and course outcomes of the college's numerous programmes. The College Prospectus highlights the learning outcomes of the courses provided right away, so students are aware of the course objectives and what is expected of them in terms of learning outcomes.

The Admission Committee also assists students in understanding the courses to be taken so that they can choose which programs/courses best suit them; educated decisions help students establish their future professions. During the Student Induction programme at the start of each Academic Session, students are also informed about the POs and COs of the programmes in which they have registered by lecturers from their respective departments. On the college website, each department's Programme and Course results, as well as the syllabus, are also available. Expected results are clearly written out semester by semester and paper by paper so that students know what is expected of them when they graduate. College website is regularly updated about the courses, number of seats, syllabus and previous year's results. College prospectus containing programs and courses offered by the college is provided to the Applicants while seeking admission in our college.

A Helpdesk is constituted in college at the time of admission to enable students to seek assistance while making a final decision about the course. Subject experts (teachers) and senior students are called during admissions to counsel applicants. The Principal and stakeholders address enrolled students on the Orientation Day when college reopens for a new academic session. Respective departments also call for Departmental Orientation, so that students get familiar with the subjects they will be learning throughout their graduation. The curriculum offers optional subjects along with core subjects. Hence, other departments organize orientation programme so that students can opt for General Elective (GE) as per their interests and career related requirements. Apart from this, Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) are offered to students where the students are trained by subject experts to provide hands-on-training, competencies, skills etc.

The college has a feedback mechanism in place where professors, students, parents and college alumnae provide candid feedback on the forms based on the curriculum, teaching-learning process, and infrastructure provided to them. The IQAC and the Academic Council immediately resolve any grievances or complaints.

Though the program outcomes, course outcomes and specific program outcomes are not mentioned in the syllabus of the affiliating university, Thoubal College has a system of measuring the levels of attainment of outcomes:

1. Attaining of Program Outcome (PO/PSO)

The program outcomes of BA/BSc/BVOC courses open at Thoubal College are based on the number of students who have completed the courses at degree level during the period of assessment.

The attainment of the program outcome is also based on the number of the students' progress to higher studies and also the students' placement in companies, industries and government jobs.

These are analyzed from the data collected by concerned committee specially IQAC of the college. The IQAC of the college has also utilized students' satisfactory survey developed by NAAC as a measure of attainment of program outcome in future.

2. Attainment of Course Outcomes (CO)

The course outcomes is measured through the syllabus and its completion, continuous evaluation internally by the college through unit tests, home assignments and mid-term examinations and analysis of the results obtained so far.

At the departmental level, the HODs and the teachers who are actively working to complete the courses in time take up special arrangements by doing extra or remedial classes for relatively below average students. The compulsory attendance of 75% to qualify for university examinations of all courses is strictly informed to the students at the beginning of the course and some percentage of internal assessment is tight up with attendance. Field study works, hands on training in related industries/firms for certain subjects are also conducted as per university curriculum and their outcomes are also noted down.

The college also has a Biotech Hub that is funded by the DBT to provide basic Biotechnology Infrastructure and research facilities for students, faculty, and researchers from individual institutions as well as nearby institutions, to organise teacher training/workshops, and to provide access to Biotechnology e-Journals. It was recently designated as an Advanced level Institutional Biotech Hub.

5. LIBRARY:

The College has a well-stocked library that is partially automated using Library Management System (LMS) 1.0 version software. All faculty and students have access to the college's extensive e-resources, which include the N-List of NMEICT and e-journals. The library includes ten working computers.

The College campus is Wi-Fi enabled, allowing both staff and students to make extensive use of the internet. The computers of the college office are connected via LAN and have internet access. A dedicated lease line is available 24x7 in a week. The campus has BSNL-provided high-speed internet access. The total bandwidth of all internet connections is 100 megabits per second. The main administrative internet connection is a dedicated leasing line. The library has connection with two PCs that are all internet connected and are used to browse the internet within the library. The library has a backup system in place to ensure that power is available at all times. During college hours, the library's Wi-Fi is accessible and available to both students and employees. There are 11 smart classrooms, each equipped with an interactive whiteboard, LCD projectors, and a desktop monitor, as well as a CPU, UPS, and sound system. There is a separate computer science department lab with 24 machines. All departments of the College have at least one computer that is connected with internet facilities. For Seminars and Project Presentations, students are urged to use computers. The computer lab is used to teach students how to use computers. Trained IT personals have been hired to update the Institute's current IT infrastructure. This includes all software upgrades, including those mandated by the syllabus and curriculum. Based on the needs of the newly launched programmes and courses, the ICT infrastructure is extended and improved with the newest version hardware and software. Periodically cross checking all the IT equipments (especially Computer labs, BIF Center, Classrooms & Library) is done and upgrade the same as and when need arises external experts are consulted. Assessment of the IT Infrastructure is done in the beginning of every academic year and also prepared for augmentation, replacement and up-gradation of the existing infrastructure.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response:

The Principal is the head of the Institution. The Principal is under the direct supervision of Director (University and Higher Education), Government of Manipur. She is responsible for the college functioning and growth including administrative, academic, co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension programme. All the teaching faculty and non-teaching staffs are under the direct control of the Principal. If they are found guilty and willingly disobeying the order of the Principal, she has the power to initiate disciplinary actions against the staff concerned. The reasons of the same are forwarded to the higher authority which includes suspension, with holding of pay and emulations etc. The Principal is also responsible for planning, budgeting and proper management of the finance related to welfare of the College.

IQAC of the college is involved in developing a quality system for conscious, programmed action to improve the academic and administrative performance of the College. Principal is the Chairperson of IQAC. A senior teacher is appointed as the Coordinator of IQAC of the college. He has been entrusted into the overall executive works of the IQAC. Faculty staffs are also appointed by the concerned authority to assist the functioning and work of the IQAC. They are entrusted with different work allotment to carry out diverse work required by the IQAC.

The college has one dean viz., Dean of Students Welfare for the progressive of the smooth functioning of students' related affaires of the college. At department level, the Head of the Departments are directly responsible for coordinating all departmental academic programmes of the college. All the teachers are directly responsible for the academic and curricular development of the students. All the teachers have been designated as Criteria in charge, Convenor or members of various committees.

The Annual Performance Appraisal Report is an important document; it reviews and assesses the performance of the staff and is reviewed for his/her further promotion. Though it is an assessment mechanism it has separate focal point for teaching and non-teaching individuals.

Teacher:

The College requires that the teachers furnish a self-evaluation form, in a prescribed format, every year. This provides an insight into one's own assessment of effectiveness of the teaching style and its impact on the students. Through this form, a teacher can showcase his/her continuous professional development (paper presentations, publications, seminars and conferences attended). The form contains the following:

1. General information of the Individual
2. Contribution in areas related to the teaching

3. Research related Experience and participation in Seminars, Conference, Workshops, Refresher and Orientation Courses etc attended during the year

4. Co-curricular activities.

The above points, stated by each teacher, are evaluated by respective Head of Department in the College. After the comments and assessment by their respective head of Departments, the format has been forwarded to the Reporting Officer who is the concerned Principal. The Reporting Officer then assessed the performance of each teacher, she gave an appropriate grading to each of the teachers ranging as follows:

1. Outstanding
2. Very Good
3. Good
4. Average
5. Below Average

After such grading, the Reporting Officer further forwarded the evaluated Performance Appraisal System format of the teachers to the Directorate of University and Higher Education. Officer in-charge of the review, acting as Reviewing Officer, gives remarks to his/her agreement or disagreement of grading so far given and forwarded the Performance Appraisal Form to Commissioner of the Education Department whose office is also acting as the Accepting Authority of the details mentioned in the Performance Appraisal System (PAS) of the teachers. It is to be noted that the decision and remarks made by the Accepting Authority is final and binding.

Non-Teaching:

As for the non-teaching staff the appraisal system is based on punctuality, execution of duties, pro-activeness and APAR for various posts in the non-teaching staff is filled by the staff annually. The performance is assessed every year on the score provided by the reporting officer. The Reporting officer, who is the Principal, assesses the report and forwards it to the Reporting Officer. Just as in the case of the Teaching staff, Performance Appraisal System format of non-teaching staff is also given by Accepting Authority, who is the Commissioner of the Education Department, Manipur.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

The various resources of funds in respect of Thoubal College, Thoubal are mainly from

- 1.State Government, for salary and its related
- 2.Students, while taking admission, as it is called Non-Government fund
- 3.Some external sources like leasing of college campus, facilities etc,
- 4.Other sources like UGC, RUSA, NEC, DBT, DST, ICSSR, etc. for infrastructure, research program etc.

So mobilisation for more funds mainly focuses on (i) Non-Government and (ii) External sources. The college actively involves admitting the maximum number of students as permitted by sanction strength. This will create more Non-Governmental funds. These funds are used in improving academic learning environmental facilities and infrastructure facilities of the college. The Budget Committee of the college, periodically, chalk out the various distribution of the non-government funds for each academic sessions. The facilities like Fitness Centre can collect a small amount from outside users from time to time. A certain amount of funds also comes from leasing out certain unutilised areas and also from the running college canteen.

Once a quarter, IQAC meetings are held to discuss ways to improve academic and administrative activities of the institution. The IQAC has been a proactive player in the overall benchmarking process, from devising strategies to improve the teaching-learning process through increased use of ICT, expanding the scope of the library, transforming it into a multifunctional knowledge portal, involving social , cultural, natural calamities, social works in local clubs, District markets. local clubs and in institutional activities. The Cell actively organized State, National and International important events along with students, teachers and NSS volunteers. Response:

- In an effort to make Thoubal College a strong institution for promoting gender equity and sensitization, steps have been initiated in terms of both curricular and co-curricular activities. The college takes pride in inculcating, upon its students, a spirit of respecting cultural diversity, social responsibilities and preserving the right of women. The college strongly adhere to Zero Tolerance towards gender discrimination.

- The college is a co-educational institution and has good representation of women in administrative, academic as well as at student levels. All genders contribute significantly towards the college functioning. The college also has separate Women Cell supervised by a woman faculty. This cell is responsible for the overall development and address the issues and challenges faced by girl students of the college
- The college is highly concerned for the safety and security of women in the college. It has separate washrooms both for women students and faculty with 24 hours water supply. Women students are also provided separate Common Room equipped with the facilities of first aid box, sanitary vending machine, cosmetic items, newspapers and indoor games such as Chess, Carom and Puzzles. A lady teacher and a woman peon are assigned to look after the girls' common room. There is a separate Women's Hostel within the college's campus. As suggested by some students and stakeholders, a separate Women Gym is going to setup in the College.

a) Solid Waste Management:

The college is registered with the Thoubal Municipal Council for Solid waste Collection that regularly collects waste generated by the college. The college have maintained sufficient Dustbin, issued by Municipal Council, at strategic location inside the college. For effective waste management it has separate bin for biodegradable as well as non-biodegradable. These wastes are collected by the Municipal and disposed at their selected place for further treatment. The waste generated in the campus includes wrappers, glass, papers, plastic, empty snack package and empty water bottles. The College authority has provided about thirty trash bins in every corner of the campus. Papers, snack package and empty water bottles are being trashed in the college trash bins. whereas, glass, wrappers and plastic are being piled in a sanitary landfill in the lone place of the college campus. Under the aegis of NCC and NSS Cell, staff and students of the college regularly clean the college campus through College Social Work.

b) Liquid Waste Management:

In its laboratories, the College follows a stringent liquid waste disposal strategy. Any laboratory glassware is rinsed with little water and disposed off in the liquid waste container. Organic and inorganic garbage are separated from liquid waste. Before being disposed of, inorganic wastes such as concentrated acidic or alkaline solutions are neutralised. The neutralisation procedure uses sodium bicarbonate or

calcium oxide (lime) to ensure that the neutralised liquid is free of hazardous substances. In order to manage liquid waste, the college drainage system drains rainwater that has overflowed on campus. To avoid wastage of water, teachers and students are ensured with the responsibility of closing water taps and pipe when not in used.

In order to manage liquid waste, the college drainage system, particularly Science laboratory blocks drains to the outside drainage of the campus. The outside drainage system is linked to the college drainage system. Urinal sheds are also connected to an exterior drain where the waste is discharged. Drainage system of Science stream is very separate with Arts Block so as rain water of the Arts Block can be used for rainwater harvesting of the college.

K. Rishikanta Singh, student of the College participated International Tae Kwondo Championship-2018 held at Tyagraj Indoor Stadium, New Delhi, 2018 and he won Gold Medal. Thoubal College is proud not only for the institution but also for the Manipur University and for the State.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

In spite of maximum efforts, the college faces many challenges especially financial constraint. The meagre amount of sports fess collected by the college from the students is not enough to organise frequent sporting events and to financial support the students when they go outside the state to participate in national and international level championships. Another problem is that of lack of man-power for training the students for various sporting events on a regular co-curricular routine. Sports infrastructure is also to be developed more for outdoor games especially.

1. To bring the Campus Green through tree plantation.
2. Preserve rare herbal plant species as a part of Botanical Garden.
3. To promote waste recycling and management.
4. To keep the Campus Clean.
5. To create awareness among the students and neighbourhood community.
6. Institutional accountability towards society.
7. Maintenance of Eco-friendly Campus.

1. The context –

Manipur, blessed forest and water resources and rich in bio-diversity, is now facing serious environmental problems. Deforestation, landslides, soil erosion, land degradation, siltation of water bodies, flooding and

extinction of rare species of wild life and fishes are serious problems in the state. Of course, problems and their manifestations widely differ on horizontal and vertical scales. Students and teachers of the college aware all these environmental problems and its consequences in the state. They also interact regularly about such environmental issues. Therefore College has decided to create a model for them by utilizing not only its campus but also the nearby adopted villages. It is one of the unique practices at our college.

1. The Practice –

The College has two entrances and one Botanical Garden magnificently decorated with the green landscaping with pleasant trees. As per the guidelines of the Planning Committee and IQAC, it was decided to set up 'Water Harvesting Ponds to the conserve the water and utilize this in the summer to watering the newly planted trees and cultivated areas inside the campus. The College has constructed two ponds having 12,600 sq.ft and 3,456 sq. ft. Rain water from the buildings of Arts Block roof and Boys' Hostel are being harvested and stored in these ponds. The stored water is utilized for agriculture, tree plantation, additional water for swimming pool and even for washing and cleaning purposes of the departments. As per College Green Audit Report, out 15 acres area of the college campus, 20 percent is covered by herbs, shrubs and trees, including valuable medicinal plants. The College has taken initiative and planted trees such as Indian meddler, Black plum, Sausage tree, Olive nut, Gol mohor, Ashoka, Mango, Teak, etc. Some of the trees have got Ayurvedic importance in medical treatment. The college has taken innovative steps to keep the environmental balance by planting the trees on the college campus. The College has been listed and counted its flora of the Campus at regular basis. Various tree plantation programmes are being conducted during World Environment Day (5 June) and Van Mahotsava (1st week of July) at college campus and adopted villages. These programmes help in encouraging eco-friendly environment which provides pure oxygen within the institute and awareness among villagers. The plantation programmes include the plantation of various types of both indigenous and exotic species of trees and shrubs. A Botanical Garden has been made within the Campus itself with many important species of trees, shrubs and herbs (both indigenous and exotic). The College has annually organised Inter Departmental Cleanliness Competition in the theme of "**Keep Campus Clean**" as a part of observation of "**Swachh Bharat Mission.**" The College has been organising many social service activities, rallies and cleanliness programmes outside the campus particularly adopted villages, market areas of Thoubal town and historical places. As for solid waste management is concerned, the bio degradable materials are collected and dumped it into the pits inside the college campus and the decomposed materials are used as fertilizer for gardening. The College is tied up with Thoubal Municipal Council for its collection and management of non-degradable materials.

1. Evidence of Success -

Since college has made water harvesting ponds as a result there is enough water to watering the planted trees and even used the cultivated firm inside the campus. The additional requirement of water for swimming pool is regularly supply from this harvested water. The trees planted in the campus, particularly in the College entrances and the Botanical Garden has made the campus green and more attractive one. Some plants of high medicinal values are very demanded by the local people. The College receives a lot of appreciations from the local people for its environment awareness campaigns by organising social service activities and rallies. The College has successfully planted many plants by using decomposed materials as fertilizer. The whole activities were performed with the students of the college particularly with NSS and NCC units. This helped them to realize that if we use water and waste carefully and properly any type of crop or tree can be well cultivated and helps the environment clean.

1. Problems Encountered and Resource Required –

The college planted many trees in the campus to make the campus green. But the cares of these trees to grow maturely is a challenging task. The College campus has no proper boundary fencing. So the protection of the newly planted trees, flowers and cultivated area from the grazing cows roaming freely nearby the campus is a matter of concerned. The cleanliness activities in the campus have always been disturbed by such cows. Therefore, boundary fencing of the college is very much important one.

1. Notes:

The College has taken initiative steps and implemented effectively with the help of teaching and non-teaching staffs. The College has strived its best to cope up all these challenges by preparing water harvesting ponds inside the campus, organising social service activities/camps in and out of the campus and planted number of different varieties of plants. In this way college has developed its plan to develop the campus green and clean and make awareness to the students and neighbouring community.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

The main vision of the college focuses on moulding and empowering students in the pursuit of knowledge, values and social responsibility and also on helping them to adapt to the changing scenarios as time evolves. One distinctive approach of the college is skill development and the college is looking at this as one of the thrust areas as envisaged in the vision.

Since the academic session 2015-16, the college has been successfully running B Voc Degree Programme in two trades:

1. Food processing and engineering
2. Tourism and hospitality management

After due assessment of skill component by the Sector Skill Council for Food Processing and Hotel Management – FICSI, New Delhi and THS – Gurgaon, Manipur University gives Diploma, Advanced Diploma and B-Voc Degree Certificates to those students who have completed one year, two years and three years respectively. The Vocational Department of this college has organised one Food Mela in the

campus itself and it was the first of such kind till date. All the colleges of Manipur having Vocational Courses participated in the Mela and many industries also took part in the same.

Students take up internship and hands-on-training in reputed industries like Thangjam Agro Industry, Classic Hotel, Imphal and other Milk Producing Industries. These generate excitement in the young minds to produce innovation and thus laying the stones for entrepreneurship. Some students have got placement in reputed hotels, hospitals etc. and even some have started their own entrepreneurships on food processing.

During 2017-18, another diploma course on food preservation technology for one year was introduced in the college as a vocational course on skill development under RUSA. Participation by these vocational students at some state run annual exhibitions like Sangai Festival, Shirui Festival, etc. inculcates entrepreneurship in those students. Further the college opened another B-Voc degree course in the trade - Yoga and Nature Cure during the session 2019-20. For opening ITEP, Thoubal College has been approved by the State Government after due permission from NCTE, New Delhi.

Thus, the traditional method of teaching learning has been transformed into skill related innovation process. With the implementation of NEP 2020, this college will be a very promising multi-disciplinary institute having Arts, Science, Vocational and teachers training courses.

Recently, a new building has been constructed to ease in teaching-learning, research and administration. The Institutes works hand in hand with all the stakeholders and the surrounding communities to bring development in teaching-learning, research and administration and for the welfare of the Thoubal District. The College's staff and student bodies also frequently involves in extending services to the community services like blood donation, in natural disasters, pandemic etc.

In 2017, 27th July Thoubal College visited to the flood affected area at Thoubal Leishangthem Khong Manung led by Principal, Thoubal College and distributed consumable items. The College students voluntarily involved in distribution of Masks, Sanitizers and napkin in and around Thoubal Bazar during pandemic period. Thoubal College was a Quarantine Centre during pandemic period and Institution staffs worked as front-liners actively contributed their high risky lives for the welfare of the Covid patients. College staffs also voluntarily donated one day salary of Rs. 2,59,736, in the month of March 2020 to Manipur Chief Minister Relief Fund for Covid-19.

Two students were selected as Campus Ambassador of 35-Khangabok AC from Thoubal College in 2021 for Electoral awareness Program.

The college has a well-defined process for student mentoring to ensure that special needs of students are identified and addressed as far as possible.

For the welfare of women teachers, students and non-teaching staffs of the College, the Directorate of University and Higher Education, Government of Manipur has set up Physical Fitness, Sanitary napkin Vending Machines, Sanitary Napkin Incinerator and 336 Nos of sanitary Pad under "Bleed with Pride Project".

The Institute has applied for opening IPR (Intellectual Property Right) Cell.

Lastly, College administration is playing a vital role to keep the college free from plastics, drugs, and other elicited materials in the campus to make it lively, fun and peaceful environment for teaching-learning and research.

Concluding Remarks :

Thoubal College is one of the oldest colleges in Manipur. The College was founded on August 8, 1963 as a night college with the goal of providing higher education to the youngsters of the entire Thoubal Sub-Division (current Thoubal district). Teachers have been contributing significantly in research and publication.

Since 2015, the College has offered incentive awards to deserving students as part of its practices. And on the
